

ANNE and JOAN OF TOULOUSE (XIV cent.)  
Saints

Anne and Joan are remembered together because they were citizens of the same city and Sisters of the same community. Both were of noble birth and made their monastery illustrious by their splendid virtues, especially their striking purity, and by miracles. They died at Toulouse about the end of the XIV cent. and were buried there. Carmelite authors call them tertiaries of their Order and saints. It seems, however, that they were simple recluses. Joan has received a cult in the Carmelite Order, but no longer does so after the most recent reform. (See below, under Joan of Toulouse).
